- Consequences for Inappropriate Behavior

 Children who demonstrate inappropriate behavior will incur the following:



SAT Scores and the Arts

Students of the arts continue to outperform their nonarts peers on the SAT, according to reports by the College Entrance Examination Board. In 1996, SAT takers with course work or experience in music ("study or appreciation") scored 60 points higher on the verbal portion and 42 points higher on the math portion than did students with no course work or experience in the arts. Scores for those with course work in music perfor-

mance were 51 points higher on the verbal portion and 36 points higher on the math portion. And longer arts study means higher SAT scores: In 1996, those who had studied the arts 1996, those who had studied the arts four or more years scored 59 points higher on verbal and 41 points higher on math than students with no course work or experience in the arts.

Data for these reports were gathered by the Student Descriptive Questionnaire, a component of the SAT that provides information about students' academic preparation.

As a follow-up to the November 2007 national poll on the correlation of music education experience with lifetime educational attainment and financial success (revealed at a recent press event with actor and musicion "Little" Steven Van Zandt and MENC: The National Association for Music Education on hand), Harris Interactive has released the results of a new poll analyzing the effects of music education on top Fortune 1000 company executives. The findings of this latest poll are similarly impressive. Overall, just under three-quarters of executives (73%) were involved in some type of music program while in school, Just over three quarters (77%) recommend their children get involved in music education at their schools and just under half (47%) support music education by donating money. Cumulatively, the longer executives participated in classroom music programs, the more successful they become in life. This information, alongside other significant data from the poll, will be made available shortly on the MENC web site.

 Twelve Benefits of Music Education

 1. Early musical training helps develop brain areas involved in language and reasoning. It is thought that brain development continues for many years after birth. Recent studies have dearly indicated that musical training physically develops the part of the left is die of the brain havour to be involved with processing language, and can actually wire the brain's circuits in specific ways. Linking familiar songs to new information can also help imprint information on young minds.

 2. A causal link exists between music & spatial intelligence (the ability to perceive the world accurately & to form mental pictures of things). This kind of intelligence, by which one can visualize various elements that should go together, is critical to the sort of thinking necessary for everything from solving advanced mathematics problems to being able to pack a book-bag with everything that will be needed for the day.

 3. Students of the arts learn to thinki creatively & to solve problems by imagining various solutions, rejecting outdader ules and assumptions. Questions about the arts do not have only one right answer.

 4. Recent studies show that students who study the arts are more successful on standardized leasts such as the SAT. They also achieve higher grades in high school.

 5. A study of the arts provides children with an internal alimpse of other cultures & teaches them to be empothetic towards the people of these cultures. This development of composion & empothy, as opposed to development of gread & a "men first" attitude, provides a bridge across cultural chasms that leads to respect of other races at one early age.

 6. Students of music learn craftmannhip as they study how details are put together painstakingly & which constitutes good, as opposed to medioare, work. These standards, when applied to a student's own work, demand a new level of excellence & require students to stretch their inn
